

# President's Piece

Welcome everyone.

We start the QCG 2021 Program with the highly regarded, award winning Guest Speaker, Mark Rayner who will talk on Bird and Wildlife photography.

What an exciting way to start out first face to face meeting of 2021.

There are many 'firsts' this year including the return of Prints and we look forward to them being proudly displayed on competition days.

Whilst we are all probably a bit jaded hearing about COVID, the reality is that restrictions apply. This has driven many of the changes you will see and experience with the club this year.

The program has been adapted to be COVID friendly with a hybrid format of F2F as well as Livestream/Zoom.

This is intended so all members can have access to the event whether they attend a meeting or stay at home. A webcam was purchased for this purpose.

We have secured SPACE as our QCG venue and hope it meets everyone's expectations. It's not perfect, yet it fulfils many of our requirements.

It is larger than Bardon Hall, has generous storage for our equipment and is all on one level and still costs the same hourly rate as Bardon.

The move from Bardon Hall to this bigger SPACE venue is timely - it takes up to 44 people now and can take more, if and when restrictions relax.

The booking registration system you will use is to maintain records of attendances and to limit the number of attendees to comply with the COVIDSafe requirements. It also reduces the need to handle cash.





A QR scanner will now greet you at the door to sign in if you are attending meetings - much like you do for other activities like going to a restaurant.

Esther Andrews has kindly taken up the role to keep us COVID safe and will instruct us as required.

The committee has worked hard to set up the space, organise the reinstallation of the projector screen, purchase equipment, set up software, dry run the technology to check it works, and purchase extra cleaning materials and sanitiser for COVID Safety.

One area requiring attention is the email system. This is a high priority to resolve the issues, particularly as some emails have gone missing (so please look at the Calendar if in doubt as it gets updated regularly).

A group of members with technology knowhow are putting their minds together to find a better solution than we have.

Our current email system costs us very little but quite some grief in frustration.

A budget is being prepared and the Committee is looking at options to achieve a balanced budget. You will hear more from our Treasurer Chris Pigott about this over the next few weeks.

In addition to updates to the Calendar and Website, the Handbook and By-Laws (which are significant QCG documents), have been updated and refreshed. These now reflect the current situation for things like competitions, definitions and awards.

All of this has required ongoing effort from the Committee and others even over the holiday period, so a big thank you to everyone for such an achievement.

We hope that you enjoy this Program. Let us know what you think and anyone with an interest in fundraising please don't hesitate to come forward.

Back to posing and shooting this month – a live model will be at our 20 February meeting. Watch your emails for details.


















# SPEAKER FOR FEBRUARY—MARK RAYNER

Competition Judging Night will be on Thursday Feb 25. All prints will be on the print stands, available to view on arrival. As the judge discusses each print, we will project digital versions via slideshow just as we do for DPIs, which makes for easier viewing by everyone. (But rest assured that the judge has made their assessment on the physical prints.) You can revisit the prints at the end of the night once awards are known, before taking your own prints home with you.

Time to step back on the treadmill of agonising over which images to enter, resisting the urge to make just one more tiny improvement in processing, and finally taking a deep breath and committing to the 'Submit your entry' button! Done!

## Tri-Nations Competition for 2021

Did You Know?

Every year since 2013 QCG has taken part in the Tri-Nations Digital Photo Competition. The Stoke Poges Photographic Club in the UK devised the competition and invited QCG and the Westville Camera Club in South Africa to be partners for this, early year highlight, three nation phot club event.

I had known of Stoke Poges long before the instigation of this event and back in the early 1970s lived not too far away in Ealing, West London. However, I have no memory of ever having visited the village but will have occasionally passed by the place.

I am very familiar with many of the surrounding towns. Southall, Hayes, Uxbridge (at the end of the Piccadilly Line), Slough, Windsor, Maidenhead, Marlow and Henleyon-Thames are all places I know quite well, but Stoke Poges seems to be off the beaten track. One passes by just to the north on the M40 to High Wycombe and on to Oxford or south through Slough on the train to Maidenhead, Reading and Bristol and just south of Slough on the M4 to Bath, Bristol and into Wales.

So I was thinking, knowing so little about the village, what is Stoke Poges' claim to fame?

Of course these days you can find out a great deal about anywhere by interrogating the Internet. And so it wasthat I found out that Stoke Poges' claim to fame is a poem – Gray's "Elegy Written in a Country Churchyard", believed to have been written in the churchyard of Saint Giles Parish Church in Stoke Poges. The poem is worth reading, I read



it, and as soon as I got to the second line realised that I had a photograph, taken early in 2020, that matched the description perfectly.

Here is the first stanza:

The curfew tolls the knell of parting day,
The lowing herd wind slowly o'er the lea,
The ploughman homeward plods his weary way,
And leaves the world to darkness and to me.

I am pleased to say that the photograph "Pastoral Scene" shown above received a merit in the August competition judged by Tryg Helander.

I will see if I can find out a Westville/Durban claim to fame for next month. Also I wonder what Stoke Poges or Westville might consider Brisbane's claim to fame. Any suggestions?
