Focus

Image Critique Session led by Elizabeth Riley, Thursday 7 July

It was another cold night in Kenmore but our enthusiasm for looking at and critiquing each other's images kept us warm (along with the great supper John Edwards always so happily provides for us).

The topic for the evening focused on providing constructive feedback on photographic images. Elizabeth Riley led our discussions, having recently been inspired after attending Kris Anderson's presentation on a similar topic at the recent Photographic Society of Queensland's annual conference.

Elizabeth shared a few of the insights she had picked up from Kris and from her experiences in the practical exercises in his session

- As the maker, let the critiquer know whether you want feedback on a specific aspect or to get their reaction 'coming in cold'
- As the critiquer, use respectful language and explain how your suggested change would benefit the image ("I think that if you did this, then you would achieve that")
- Don't tear an image to pieces, pick the one or two points that could make the most improvement to an image (in your opinion).

The meeting also discussed the Critique Corner function of My Photo Club. Critique Corner—which allows members to upload an image to MPC and seek feedback from fellow members—got off to an enthusiastic start at the beginning of the year, but has subsequently fallen off our radar a little. Elizabeth also reminded us that Critique Corner allowed members to upload two images at a time, allowing the maker to supply two versions of an image on which they'd like to seek feedback and preferences.

The evening concluded with participants eagerly putting their new knowledge to the test. Most participants brought images to be critiqued and most of the members in attendance stepped up ably. A great night.

Speaker Review

Tips, Tricks and Favourite Destinations by Adam Edwards, Thursday 14 July

Shooting with intent is the mantra of passionate landscape photographer and this month's speaker, Adam Edwards. A professional photographer for 20 years, Adam shared his tips, tricks and favourite destinations with a great group of QCG members who peppered Adam with a wide range of questions and insights.

In a very down-to-earth presentation that clearly caught the attention of the Zoomed members present, Adam shared that the best images are shot with intent, with planning and review a huge part of his workflow before he even gets out his camera. His preference for simple compositions bely the attention to detail which goes into the creation of each one. The strength of Adam's preparation and his love for the histogram (he typically exposes to the left) means he spends very little time in post processing—three minutes and often on his iPad.

Adam's best and favourite tip was a postprocessing one. He feels colour balance is probably one of the most important aspects of ensuring what you see in your image is what you saw in the field. To achieve this, Adam recommends turning the Saturation (in Lightroom) to 100. Edit to recreate the colours you feel should be represented in the image, then take the slide back toward Zero/neutral to reveal a perfectly colour balanced image!

Photo Shoot Outing

The guidance for shooting propeller aircraft is slow the shutter speed down and pan to get the propeller as a blur. That quickly went out the window, when you start trying to track aerobatic aircraft, they rarely fly in a consistent path to get a good pan. Ended up with a lot of blurred images.

Looking at all the images posted by our members though it certainly looks like they got the hang of it. There were some great images there. Focus Group: Skill Seekers


What I like to use in Photoshop by Jay Mooney, Tuesday 19 July

The Skill Seekers held in July was led by QCG member Jay Mooney. Jay is an experienced user of Photoshop and as such, was keen to share some of the basics which she uses frequently in her workflow. Attendees were encouraged to bring along a laptop and Jay provide images on which we could either work or observe others. Amongst other things Jay showed us ways to easily straighten the horizon, how to use the quick mask feature and perspective. Jay then moved on to the clone tool, showing us how to 'tile images', that is, have two images open and showing at once, allowing the maker to clone from one image to another (great for swapping faces or creating a mosaic). Jay's talk was excellent and she has promised to come back to talk us through layers.













Competitions Update

Sue Gordon, past president of PSQ and another frequent judge for our club, was the judge this month for Negative Space and Open. Negative Space is one of the set subjects for this year's Queensland Interclub Digital Photographic Competition, so these images will provide the pool for selecting QCG's entries. Sue as usual was generous in her explanations of what worked in an image, and how it might be improved. I found her comments about how the 'negative space' need not be completely empty, but should not compete with the 'positive' elements for attention, very helpful. Another interesting concept was that sometimes the negative space can be implied, for example with a person gazing into the distance.

Thanks to Keith Fincham for volunteering to take on some of the slide advancement and title, result and maker announcements on competition nights. Expect to hear more of his voice in future!

Coming up later this year we have our Portfolio Night competitions (Three Related Images and the Audio Visual competition), so look out for criteria and submission instructions on the MyPhotoClub website in the near future. And the Year End Photographic Awards criteria will also be available soon.



Covid has of course thrown a little spanner in the works of how our weekend away competition ordinarily runs, so for members who are new as well as members who are experienced, here's the history.

On the Saturday night of the joint weekend away we have a friendly competition and it's a lot of fun.

In the past, there has been a set subject and this was photographed by participants and entered in the immediate next joint weekend away. We then also introduced an Open subject, so that if you did not attend a weekend away, you could still participate in the friendly competition in the Open section. So, because we had to cancel last year's weekend away, we are going to still use the 2019 set subject of 'Life's a Beach' but anyone who did not attend that weekend away may enter as long as their image or images fit the theme. Here it is in summary:
