I noted the work of some of our members who have only been part of the club for the past year or so, and the improvement in the photography was there for all to see, as a number were placed highly in our annual judging.

As well as the camaraderie of fellow enthusiasts, one of the objectives of joining a camera club is to improve our photography, and it is pleasing to witness this in progress. I know we all have our down months when our work doesn't appeal to some judges (can you relate to that?), but I think if we reflect on our improvement we can all be proud of our achievements.

Speaking of achievements, I was so pleased to see our club's representation in the recent Zephyr Awards, a new creative competition run by the Photographic Society of Queensland. This is a genre that isn't always at the top of mind at QCG, but a number of members achieved great results, with Elizabeth Riley achieving a highly commended and Kate Stock and Yvonne Hill being finalists, and many members receiving acceptances. Our annual Portfolio Night again delivered, and I must admit it is one of my favourite nights of the year (nothing to do with the Jaffas, of course!) The importance of a project in photography drives a lot of people, and the AV and Three Related Images are all good avenues to display a project. The standard of AVs was again fantastic, and not only did Anne Pappalardo, Joy Melchiori and Elizabeth Riley receive Honours for their work in this competition, the same AVs were recognised with Acceptances at National level. It was also pleasing to see the great work in AVs by newish members Twiggy Daniels, Steve Andrews, Mel Sinclair, Zara Azizi and Maz Kazemi. It might even inspire this lazy President into creating an AV next year!

The Annual Gala judging day is always a highlight of our calendar, as we witness contenders for the best imagery of the year in a relaxed environment. Congratulations to all of the makers!



Three Related Images



Kate Stock's 'Shadowplay' was also a finalist and 'Lifeblood' received an Acceptance.


Yvonne Hill's 'Black Magic' was a Finalist.

Former editor, David Bullock, is currently digitizing all of our old hard copy newsletters to make sure we never lose these precious records.

Prism under a new editor can take whatever form you like. Feel free to copy the current format (this template will ensure a super-easy handover) or do with it what you please. It is elastic. Always has been, and that is because it needs to fit around the editor, the club, and communication trends.

What are the benefits of being the editor?

Organised: believe me, you will never miss a QCG deadline or outing because Prism means you are always looking back, and forward!

Engaged: you have a special understanding of the club, its purpose, its committee and its calendar because you are sharing its essence with your readers.

Feel good: Prism is an important part of the fabric of the club and most members enjoy reading it. For that reason alone I always feel good about editing it, but I cannot tell you how many people write to me to say thank you after each month's publication. It's lovely.

What's involved:

In its current form, every month you assemble stories from various contributors, and write the stories that don't have an organiser/author. Martin Riley, Peter Moodie, Elizabeth Riley, Gaye Edwards all contribute set pieces. Tony FitzGerald provides the photos. You fill in the blanks. Prism comes out once a month.

What skills are needed:

I don't have layout skills but I'm comfortable stringing words together, so that helps. If you can layout a basic page and put some words down, you're qualified. I use Microsoft Publisher to put the newsletter together, and it is easy and flexible to use.

How much time does it take:

My workflow is that after each QCG event, I write or layout the page in Prism for that event. In that way, by the end of the month, Prism is almost finished and just needs a tidy up.

How come there are never any mistakes in Prism:

It's because Elizabeth Riley and Nick Lefebvre proof read it. Hopefully they will stick around to help with this job, and I can help too.

What resources are available to make it shine:

I have a whole library of photos and logos which I can transfer to you.

If you have selected "Critique Corner" please upload here prior to sending me an email, so it's there waiting.

Please size your images to club guidelines.
